About the Cast and Crew

James Carroll (*Dr. Wangel*) has previously appeared with the Players as Gottfried Swetts (The Devil) in Tony Kushner's *A Bright Room Called Day*, Bennett in Tom Stoppard's *Travesties*, Edward Seton in Phillip Barry's *Holiday*, David Bliss in Noel Coward's *Hay Fever* and The Norwegian Captain in Lee Blessing's *Fortinbras*, and has directed David Ives' *Foreplay*, or the Art of the Fugue for the Players. He has also been observed playing percussion with the Longy Brazilian Ensemble (next concert: May 13th at 8pm) and working on distributed computing projects for The Open Group.

Steve Dubin (*The Stranger*, Co-Producer) has been acting strange for 37 years. Now he's stepping it up a notch. Look for him in upcoming productions of "Stranger in a Strange Land" and "Dr. Strangelove."

Ben Dubrovsky (*Dr. Arnholm*) returns to Norway to paint a house at midnight. This biographer found Dubrovsky eating and drinking as he usually does while he plots against Rosenbaum—most recently by selling him poisoned antique door-knockers—and for whom he first writes Shakespeare, and then subsequently cuts it up into little pieces. He would like to publicly state that he is heartily sorry for consuming an entire bottle of Perrier-Jouer Brut '89, but when asked if he really believed that, as inventor of the bottle in the first place, he had the right to drink any bottle anywhere, he said merely, "Yup."

Peter Floyd (*Ballested*, Co-Producer) joins George Spelvin, Polonius, Chuck III, Ned Seton, Henry Carr, Richard Greatham, George Spelvin (again), Antonio, and one very sexually frustrated knight in saying, "Thank you, thank you, thank you very much."

Andrea Gargiulo (Director) has studied directing with nationally known directors David Wheeler, Scott Zigler, and Marcus Stern of the American Repertory Theatre (A.R.T.) and acting with Charles Levin of the A.R.T. and Peter Kelley of the Harrison Project. She has appeared as an actress in a number of productions at the Landsdowne Street

Theatre in Boston as well as in industrial and independent feature films. In 1996 she produced John Patrick Shanley's *Four Dogs and a Bone* on the main stage of the Boston Center for the Arts.




