**Study Questions:** 

- Late in <u>Copenhagen</u>, the physicists Niels Bohr and Werner Heisenberg have the following exchange: *Bohr:* Heisenberg, I have to say – if people are to be measured strictly in terms of observable quantities . . ." *Heisenberg:* "Then we should need a strange new quantum ethics. There'd be a place in heaven for me." (92) What are these two men saying to each other? What does Heisenberg mean by "quantum ethics"?
- 2. What is Margrethe's role in this play? How does her comment that "what I see isn't a story? It's confusion and rage . . . " (p. 73) reflect on the central methodological principle of 15.269?
- 3. Could Frayn have written this play about businesspeople? What organizational roles might Bohr and Heisenberg fill?
